#### AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE EUROPEAN COMMUNITIES AND ICELAND

Biennial Report on the Operation of the Agreement

Communication from the Parties

The report below presents the information received from the Permanent Delegation of the European Commission, dated 21 March 2000. It is organized in accordance to the Standard Format for Information on Regional Trade Agreements (WT/REG/W/6).

#### I. BACKGROUND INFORMATION ON THE AGREEMENT

#### 1. Membership and Dates of Signature, Ratification and Entry into Force

The trade agreement between the European Community and Iceland has undergone considerable change since 1994. At that time the existing free trade agreements were largely replaced by a new agreement, the Agreement on the European Economic Area (EEA), which links the European Union (EU) and Iceland, together with Norway and Liechtenstein, in a broad integrated economic agreement.

#### 2. Type of Agreement

The EEA Agreement provides for the freedom of movement of goods, persons, services and capital, throughout the territories of the Contracting Parties. It provides for a high degree of economic integration, set out in a large number of Protocols and Annexes.

It also contains provisions for the strengthening and broadening of co-operation among the Parties in a wide range of activities, including research and technological development, information services, the environment, youth policy, education and training.

All transitional periods associated with the free trade area established by the EC/Iceland Agreement have long expired. The EEA Agreement provides for some transitional periods to allow for adaptation to the full terms of the Agreement. Most of these have also now expired, but some remain subject to periodic review and will expire as the Contracting Parties' legislation converges. As additional legislation is integrated into the Agreement, the Parties may establish further transitional periods, to allow for their adaptation.

#### II. TRADE PROVISIONS

- 1. Import Restrictions &
- 2. Export Restrictions

The EEA Agreement confirms that all trade in non-agricultural products between the EC and Iceland is free of duty or quantitative restrictions (as has been the case since the mid-1980s). Arrangements for trade in agricultural products are set out in a number of specific Protocols.

The extent of liberalisation under the EEA Agreement is only possible because the non-EU members have agreed to take over in its entirety the whole of the Community *acquis* in the relevant economic sectors. This is done on an ongoing basis, and requires a continuing effort on the part of the Contracting Parties to integrate new *acquis* into the Agreement.

The EEA Agreement prohibits the use of trade defence instruments in relation to areas covered by its provisions and in which the Community *acquis* is fully integrated into the Agreement. The Agreement provides that the non-EU Contracting Parties will take over the EU's *acquis* into their national legislation. This concerns a wide range of trade instruments and measures, including standards, rules of origin, Veterinary and Phytosanitary regulations, rules on state-aids and competition etc.

#### 8. Sector-Specific Provisions

Those products falling within chapters 1 to 24 of the Harmonized System and a small number of other products of agricultural origin, are covered by the EEA Agreement only to a limited extent, as set out in specific protocols to the Agreement (Protocol 3 for processed agricultural products, Protocol 9 for fisheries products). The Protocols which formed part of the 1973 EC/Iceland FTA have been incorporated in the EEA agreement, to the extent that they have not been completely overtaken by the Protocols forming part of the new Agreement.

The EEA Agreement also includes a provision foreseeing future bilateral negotiations for additional liberalisation in the agricultural sector. As yet the Parties have not availed themselves of this possibility.

#### III. GENERAL PROVISIONS OF THE AGREEMENT

#### 5. Institutional Framework

The EEA Agreement is managed on an ongoing basis by a Joint Committee which meets on a monthly basis. Political direction is provided by a Joint Council, and a number of other institutions with consultation, surveillance, judicial and arbitration functions are set up under the Agreement.
