**DECLARATION OF THE UNITED MEXICAN STATES AS A COUNTRY FREE FROM
AUJESZKY'S DISEASE IN THE PIG-FARMING SECTOR**

COMMUNICATION FROM MEXICO

The following communication, dated 1 July 2015, is being circulated at the request of the delegation of Mexico.

1. Pursuant to Article 7 of the Agreement on the Application of Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures and paragraph 3(b) of Annex B thereto, Mexico hereby advises WTO Members that the Decision declaring the United Mexican States to be a country free from Aujeszky's disease in the pig-farming sector was published in the Mexican Official Journal on 24 June 2015.

2. The notified Decision declares the United Mexican States to be an area free from Aujeszky's disease in the pig-farming sector, in accordance with Mexican Official Standard NOM-007-ZOO-1994 (National Campaign against Aujeszky's disease), which is binding throughout national territory and establishes the procedures, activities, criteria, strategies and operational techniques for the diagnosis, prevention, control and eradication of the disease.

3. The Decision was published in order to declare the United Mexican States to be an area free from Aujeszky's disease. In order to maintain the country's disease-free status, prevention, diagnosis and epidemiological surveillance activities will continue to be implemented, in accordance with Articles 78, 160 and 161 of the Federal Law on Animal Health and Articles 92, 347, 348, 350, 352 and 354 of the Implementing Regulations for the Federal Law on Animal Health.
