**UPDATE ON THE OPERATION OF THE STANDARDS AND  
TRADE DEVELOPMENT FACILITY**

NOTE BY THE SECRETARIAT<sup>1</sup>

**1 OVERVIEW**

1.1. The Standards and Trade Development Facility (STDF) is a global partnership that supports developing countries to implement international food safety, animal and plant health standards, guidelines and recommendations, and hence to gain and maintain access to markets. In doing so, the partnership contributes to broader sustainable development goals of economic growth, poverty reduction and food security.

1.2. The STDF was established by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE), the World Bank, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the WTO (the founding partners). Other organizations involved in SPS-related technical cooperation, donors contributing funds to the STDF and selected developing country experts participate actively in the Facility's work. The Secretariats of the Codex Alimentarius Commission and the International Plant Protection Convention (IPPC) also participate in the partnership. The STDF is managed and housed by the WTO.

1.3. The STDF acts as a coordinating and financing mechanism.<sup>2</sup> By bringing together the SPS expertise and skills of its founding partners and other organizations, the STDF provides a unique platform for information exchange and strengthens collaboration in SPS capacity building. As a financing mechanism, STDF provides grants for projects and to support project formulation based on appropriate assessment of the SPS-related capacity building needs. Applications are particularly encouraged from Least Developed Countries (LDCs).

1.4. This document provides an update on STDF's work since the last Committee meeting in July 2015. Annex 1 provides a brief overview of on-going STDF projects and project preparation grants (PPGs). Delegates who would like to receive more information on the STDF are invited to visit the STDF website and subscribe to the STDF electronic mailing list.<sup>3</sup> The next STDF Working Group meeting will be held on 12-13 October 2015.

**2 IMPLEMENTING SPS MEASURES TO FACILITATE SAFE TRADE**

2.1. The STDF issued a new short film titled "Safe Trade Solutions"<sup>4</sup> during the Fifth Global Review of Aid for Trade which took place under the theme "Reducing Trade Costs for Inclusive, Sustainable Growth" in Geneva from 30 June to 2 July 2015.<sup>5</sup> The film takes a look at what Chile, Peru and Colombia have done to make goods flow faster across their borders, while also preventing the spread of pests or diseases among animals and plants, and ensuring that food is safe for consumers. The film is a useful training and awareness raising tool for SPS practitioners and other border agencies.

2.2. The film was launched at a high-level plenary session during the Global Review, coordinated by the STDF, entitled "Effective Implementation of SPS Measures to Facilitate Safe Trade" on 30 June 2015.<sup>6</sup> The plenary session brought together a diverse mix of panelists, including, *inter alia*, José Graziano da Silva, Director-General of the FAO, Monique Eloit, Deputy Director-General and Director-General Elect of the OIE, and Anabel González, Senior Director of the Global Practice on Trade and Competitiveness in the World Bank Group. Representatives from governments and the private sector also participated. Together they debated on how trade facilitation can be married with robust, science and risk-based SPS controls. A full podcast of the session is available on the WTO website.<sup>7</sup>

2.3. The film also complements research work by the STDF in selected countries in Southeast Asia and Southern Africa on how SPS controls are implemented for selected agri-food products, based on the relevant provisions of the SPS Agreement (notably Article 8 and Annex C on Control, Inspection and Approval Procedures). This work aims to identify key needs, opportunities and good practices to improve the implementation of SPS measures in a way that facilitates safe trade, and also strengthens health protection. The report on Southeast Asia (focused on Cambodia, Lao People's Democratic Republic, the Philippines and Thailand) is available on the STDF website.<sup>8</sup> The report on Southern Africa (focused on Malawi, South Africa and Zambia) was finalized and will become available on the STDF website after the Working Group meeting.

### 3 JOINT EIF/STDF ANALYSIS ON SPS ISSUES IN DTIS STUDIES

3.1. The STDF and the Enhanced Integrated Framework (EIF) Secretariat are undertaking a joint study that analyses the coverage of SPS issues in EIF Diagnostic Trade Integration Studies (DTIS) and identifies good practice for future studies and their implementation.<sup>9</sup> Following a preliminary review of all DTIS reports, Cambodia, Tanzania and Senegal were selected for an in-depth field study, while an additional twenty DTIS reports were selected for further desk review. Preliminary results will be shared and discussed in the upcoming STDF Working Group. The study will be finalized and become available on the STDF website in the coming months.

### 4 SPS MARKET ACCESS PRIORITIZATION

4.1. The STDF is revising and finalizing a decision-support tool to help developing countries prioritizing SPS investment options for market access (SPS-MAP). The SPS-MAP framework, based on the use of multi criteria decision analysis, aims to enhance the economic efficiency of SPS investment decisions, promote more transparent decision-making, and encourage dialogue among public and private stakeholders with an interest in SPS issues. The Secretariat recently participated in a workshop in Zambia, facilitated by COMESA, to support the prioritization of SPS investments in the country. A practical and user-friendly guidance document will become available towards the end of this year. More information on this work is available on the STDF website.<sup>10</sup>

### 5 DOCUMENTS FOR STDF VIRTUAL LIBRARY

5.1. The STDF Virtual Library is an online information repository providing quick and easy online access to a variety of information resources focused on SPS technical cooperation and capacity building.<sup>11</sup> Members and observer organizations can submit relevant documents to the Secretariat ([STDFSecretariat@wto.org](mailto:STDFSecretariat@wto.org)) for inclusion in the Library. These may include: project documents and final reports, training materials, project evaluations/reviews, SPS capacity needs assessments, cost-benefit analyses, case studies, relevant research papers and other articles on SPS capacity building.

## 6 PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

6.1. The STDF provides advice and support to applicants on issues related to SPS project development and finances project preparation grants (PPGs). This assists applicants in the articulation of their SPS needs and the development of technically sound and sustainable project proposals. Seed funding up to US\$50,000 is available for PPGs, which can be used for any of the following purposes (or a combination thereof): (i) application of SPS-related capacity evaluation and prioritization tools; (ii) preparation of feasibility studies that precede project development to assess the potential impact and economic viability of proposals (expected costs and benefits); and/or (iii) preparation of project proposals that can be funded by other donors or STDF.

6.2. A total of 66 PPGs have been approved and funded by the STDF since its inception. The STDF Working Group may approve additional PPGs for funding at its next meeting on 12-13 October 2015.

## 7 PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION

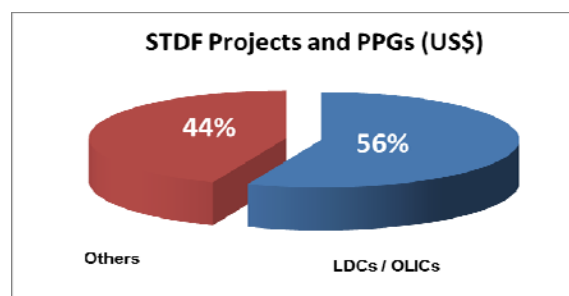
7.1. Project grant financing up to a maximum of US\$1,000,000 is available from the STDF. Favourable consideration is given to projects that focus on one or more of the following: (i) identification, development and dissemination of good practice in SPS-related technical cooperation, including the development and application of innovative and replicable approaches; (ii) regional approaches to address SPS constraints; and/or (iii) implementation of collaborative approaches across food safety, animal and plant health and trade, and benefiting from the involvement of two or more STDF partners or other relevant organizations.

7.2. Beneficiaries must contribute to the project from their own resources, either in the form of financial or in-kind contributions such as staff time, use of premises, vehicles or other existing assets.

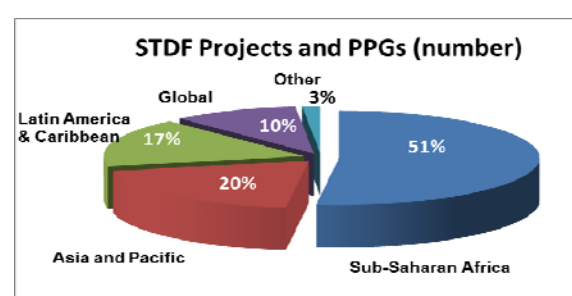
7.3. A total of 72 projects have been approved for STDF funding since its inception. The STDF Working Group may approve additional projects for funding at its next meeting on 12-13 October 2015.

7.4. Annex 1 provides an overview of on-going STDF projects and PPGs. Since its inception, the STDF has devoted 56% of its project and PPG resources to LDCs and other low income countries (OLICs), as shown in Figure 1. Hence, the STDF is consistently meeting its target to devote at least 40% of its project and PPG resources to LDCs and OLICs. In particular the allocation of PPG resources to LDCs and OLICs remains high (i.e. 74% of the overall budget for PPGs).

7.5. Figure 2 above indicates that 51% of the number of STDF projects and PPGs has gone to Sub-Saharan Africa, 20% to Asia, and 17% to Latin America and the Caribbean. In addition, 10% of STDF projects and PPGs can be classified as global.

7.6. Applications for STDF funding can be made at any point in the year but should be received at least 60 working days in advance of each Working Group meeting in order to be considered at that meeting. The next deadline for the submission of applications is **25 December 2015**. Further information on eligibility criteria, application forms, etc. is available on the STDF website.
