USDA-FAS, in partnership with Colorado State University, trained local veterinarian and regional coordinators on modern animal health advice, and development of associations in support of the animal disease surveillance system in Georgia. 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Page 50, third entry, regarding Food Safety:

<b>19 July 2010- 22 July 2010</b> Food Labelling Course \$5,000	A USFDA expert and an academic professor trained 24 participants (industry, trade development and regulatory agencies) from West Africa during a 4-day course on USFDA food and dietary supplement labelling regulations, open dating requirements and UPC product codes. The course was held in Accra, Ghana and was intended to facilitate increased trade.	Ghana and three other countries in West Africa

23 Aug 2010- <b>2 Sept 2010</b>  HACCP Implementation Plan Activity  \$30,000	The USDA-FAS worked with the Government of Nigeria (GON) and private sector facilities to help improve its GON HACCP Implementation Strategic Plan to increase food security and ensure the safety and nutrition of foods and agricultural products in Nigeria and addressed potential hazards that can occur in food processing facilities. This set the stage for a risk based inspections and approvals process, which will increase access to critical commodities thus enhancing food security.	Nigeria
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
