## ADAPTATION OF THE COMMON VETERINARY ENTRY DOCUMENT TO THE TRADE CONTROL AND EXPERT SYSTEM (TRACES)

Communication from the European Communities

The following communication, dated 29 November 2006, is being circulated at the request of the Delegation of the European Communities.

- 1. In document G/SPS/GEN/489 (18 May 2004) the European Communities informed its trade partners about the introduction of TRACES, a new automated system designed to improve the management of animal movements both from outside and within the European Union. The new database reduces administrative formalities both for economic operators as well as the competent authorities. For example, a consignment of animals moved from Spain to Italy via France can be managed by TRACES using a single electronic form.
- 2. The system will also reduce administrative formalities for imported products. For example, for a consignment of products that arrives in Antwerp, the inspector at the border inspection post (BIP) will be able to fill in part I of the Common Veterinary Entry Document (CVED) describing the details of the consignment. If after checking the products, the veterinary authority at the BIP authorizes the consignment, this CVED is immediately sent to the competent authority at the destination.
- 3. In view of the necessity to adapt numerous pre-existing veterinary certificates to the informatics exchange system TRACES, the Commission has taken this opportunity to simplify the legal frame by adapting numerous existing certificates under different legislation in two single texts. More than one hundred legal acts have been deleted.
  - (a) The first text is Commission Decision 2006/696 of 28 August 2006<sup>1</sup> that consolidates into a single piece of legislation the import conditions for the commodities circulating in the HS positions indicated below.
    - (i) Live poultry, (HS 0105) including day old chicks;
    - (ii) Eggs and egg products (HS 0408) including specified pathogen-free eggs;

- (iii) Hatching eggs (HS 0407 00 11);
- (iv) Minced poultry meat (HS 1602 31), and mechanically separated meat (poultry, ratites);
- (v) Minced poultry meat from wild game-birds (HS 0208 90 20), and mechanically separated meat (wild game-birds);
- (vi) Poultry meat (HS 0207); and
- (vii) Wild game-birds (HS 0208 90 20).
- (b) The second text is Annex II to Commission Regulation 1664/2006 of 6 November 2006<sup>2</sup> modifying the certificates in Annex VI to Commission Regulation (EC) No 2074/2005<sup>3</sup> for the commodities circulating in the HS positions indicated below.
  - (i) Frogs' legs (HS 0208 20) and Snails, other than sea snails (HS 0307 60 or 16.05);
  - (ii) Gelatine (HS 3503, 3504);
  - (iii) Collagen Raw materials for the production of gelatine intended for human consumption and collagen intended for human consumption (HS 0202, 0206, 4101, 4102, 4103, 0506);
  - (iv) Fishery products in headings (HS 03.01 to 03.07, 05.11.91, 15.04, 15.18.00, 16.03, 16.04, 16.05);
  - (v) Live bivalve molluscs (HS 0307); and
  - (vi) Honey and other apiculture products, for human consumption (HS 0409, 0410).
- 4. Models of the new certificates are explicit in both legal acts, and available in all Community languages. They can be downloaded from Eurlex.<sup>4</sup> Search first the date of the Official Journal and then the corresponding act.

- 6. Note that useful information about the EC' member States' import requirements for the commodities circulating in the HS positions concerned is available at the EU Export Helpdesk<sup>5</sup>, an online service provided by the European Commission, to facilitate market access for developing countries to the European Union. This free and user-friendly service provides relevant information required by developing country exporters interested in supplying the EC market. Once the new certificates have been made available to Trade Operators, for a supplementary explanation on national requirements (if any) and taxes, go to section "Requirement and Taxes" enter the country of origin and the EC' member State of destination.
