Addendum

La communication ci-après, datée du 5 juin 2008, est distribuée à la demande de la délégation des États-Unis.

1. En réponse à la demande figurant dans le document G/SPS/W/101, les États-Unis ont adressé au Secrétariat la liste ci-après* des activités d'assistance technique menées entre le 1^{er} juin 2006 et le 31 mai 2008 en faveur des pays en développement et des États ayant accédé récemment à l'indépendance, conformément à l'article 9 de l'Accord sur l'application des mesures sanitaires et phytosanitaires. Pendant cette période, les États-Unis ont parrainé 420 projets d'assistance technique dans 124 pays en développement dans les domaines de l'innocuité des produits alimentaires, de la santé des animaux et de la préservation des végétaux. La valeur totale de ces programmes est d'environ 22 120 930 dollars EU. Les États-Unis poursuivent leurs efforts pour adapter leurs programmes aux demandes d'assistance technique formulées par les pays en développement grâce au questionnaire élaboré par le Comité SPS de l'OMC.

2. Les États-Unis appellent également l'attention sur les documents G/SPS/GEN/181, G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.1, G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.2, G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.3, G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.4, G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.5 et G/SPS/GEN/181/Add.6, qui renvoient aux précédents rapports annuels sur l'assistance technique liée aux mesures SPS fournie par divers organismes des États-Unis. On trouvera ci-après la description de plusieurs projets particuliers, ainsi que le tableau des autres activités d'assistance technique.

ENGAGEMENT DES ÉTATS-UNIS EN FAVEUR DE L'ASSISTANCE TECHNIQUE DANS LE CADRE DE L'ACCORD SPS

Programme de renforcement des capacités commerciales dans le domaine SPS de l'ALEAC-RD

3. Depuis 2005, les États-Unis soutiennent la collaboration avec leurs partenaires de l'Accord de libre-échange États-Unis-Amérique centrale-République dominicaine (ALEAC-RD) par le biais du Programme de renforcement des capacités dans le domaine SPS de l'ALEAC-RD. Ce programme est financé essentiellement par l'Agence pour le développement international des États-Unis (USAID) et mis en œuvre par le Département de l'agriculture des États-Unis (USDA).

4. Le programme soutient le renforcement des capacités pour les systèmes de préservation des végétaux, de santé des animaux et d'innocuité des produits alimentaires. L'accent est mis sur l'harmonisation des réglementations SPS avec les organismes internationaux de normalisation (Codex, CIPV, OIE) et sur l'augmentation des possibilités d'exportation pour les produits végétaux, horticoles et animaux aux niveaux régional et international. Le programme SPS de l'ALEAC-RD répond à des objectifs généraux essentiels, y compris assister les pays d'Amérique centrale dans la diversification de leurs économies, soutenir le renforcement des exportations de produits agricoles et tirer parti des préférences liées à l'accord de libre-échange pour les États-Unis. Parmi les domaines d'assistance clés figurent le renforcement des capacités des laboratoires, l'équivalence viande/volaille avec les États-Unis, la formation sanitaire concernant les produits laitiers, l'identification des maladies des animaux et des plantes et la formation nécessaire pour satisfaire aux prescriptions commerciales réglementaires américaines et internationales. L'USDA met à disposition un Conseiller SPS pour mener les programmes d'assistance technique.

5. Des exemples d'activités de renforcement des capacités SPS menées dans le cadre de ce programme entre 2006 et 2008 sont présentés ci-après.

A. FORMATION RÉGIONALE AUX BONNES PRATIQUES SANITAIRES CONCERNANT LES PRODUITS LAITIERS

6. L'Université d'État de l'Utah a formé, du 1^{er} janvier au 31 mars 2007, des fonctionnaires gouvernementaux, des représentants de l'industrie laitière et des producteurs laitiers aux pratiques sanitaires agricoles au Nicaragua, au Honduras, au Guatemala et en El Salvador. Cet atelier interactif comprenait une formation sur le tas en matière de bonnes procédures pour la santé animale et la collecte du lait. Cet atelier sur les bonnes pratiques sanitaires concernant les produits laitiers a amélioré la sécurité sanitaire et la qualité du lait cru et élargi les débouchés commerciaux pour le marché régional.

B. FORMATION RÉGIONALE EN MATIÈRE DE LIMITATION DES RISQUES POUR LES TOMATES ET LES POIVRONS

7. L'USDA a organisé, du 6 au 10 novembre 2006, un atelier en El Salvador, à l'intention des responsables de la préservation des végétaux en Amérique centrale portant sur la lutte contre les parasites et les maladies liées à l'exportation de poivrons et de tomates vers les États-Unis. Cette activité a amélioré la capacité de l'USDA à évaluer les conditions phytosanitaires des pays de l'ALEAC et a amélioré la capacité des pays de l'ALEAC à tirer parti de nouveaux débouchés commerciaux. En l'espace d'un mois après la conclusion de cette activité, El Salvador et le Honduras ont exporté neuf containers de poivrons et en mars 2007, les pays de l'ALEAC avaient tous ensemble expédié un volume de poivrons équivalant à 55 millions de dollars EU.

C. LUTTE BIOLOGIQUE CONTRE LES MOUCHES DES FRUITS DE QUARANTAINE

8. L'Université A&M du Texas a fourni une formation continue et une assistance technique aux laboratoires agricoles nationaux des pays de l'ALEAC-RD et du Panama. Cette formation s'est tenue à Managua (Nicaragua) et a porté sur la mise en œuvre de bonnes pratiques de laboratoire pour les sections chargées de la santé animale, de la préservation des végétaux, de la microbiologie alimentaire et des résidus de chaque laboratoire national. L'USDA a travaillé avec les directeurs des laboratoires à l'élaboration de programmes de formation adaptés à chaque laboratoire, portant sur des méthodes et des procédures d'essai spécifiques de nature à faciliter les échanges de produits agricoles dans le cadre de l'ALEAC-RD et de l'Accord de promotion des échanges commerciaux entre les États-Unis et le Panama.

Le programme de bourses Cochran

9. Le programme de bourses Cochran parraine des programmes de formation aux États-Unis à l'intention des fonctionnaires et des représentants du monde agricole de pays en développement. Les programmes de formation durent en général une à deux semaines et sont menés en coopération avec un large éventail d'universités américaines. Le programme de bourses Cochran est mis en œuvre et financé essentiellement par l'USDA.

10. Il est ouvert aux participants de pays en développement et de pays à revenu moyen d'Afrique, du Moyen-Orient, d'Amérique latine, des Caraïbes et d'Asie. Entre le 1^{er} juin 2006 et le 31 mai 2008, 417 stagiaires de 54 pays ont participé à des programmes Cochran liés aux mesures SPS, y compris l'Argentine, la Bulgarie, la Chine, El Salvador, le Ghana, l'Inde, la Jamaïque, la Malaisie, les Philippines, la Roumanie, le Tadjikistan, l'Ukraine, le Viet Nam et la Zambie.
