NOTIFICATION CONCERNING THE DECISION UNDER PARAGRAPH 1 OF ANNEX III OF THE AGREEMENT ON IMPLEMENTATION OF ARTICLE VII OF THE GENERAL AGREEMENT ON TARIFFS AND TRADE 1994

TUNISIA

The following communication, dated 26 April 2001, has been received from the Permanent Mission of Tunisia.

Further to its note No. 499 of 27 October 2000, the Permanent Mission of Tunisia in Geneva has the honour to attach herewith Tunisia's second progress report pursuant to the second paragraph of the Decision of 10 May 2000 granting Tunisia an extension under paragraph 1 of Annex III to the Agreement on Customs Valuation.

In view of the reference in the report to Tunisia's technical assistance requirements in that area, we have also attached, for your information, a copy of the table sent to the Committee on Trade and Development and the Technical Cooperation Division concerning the technical cooperation activities requested by Tunisia, particularly those relating to the implementation of the Agreement on Customs Valuation.

PURPOSE

To inform the WTO Committee on Customs Valuation of the progress made by Tunisia in implementing the work programme for the implementation of the Agreement on Customs Valuation, as called for by the Decision of 10 May 2000 granting an exemption from implementation of this Agreement and setting out the terms and conditions of the exemption.

STATUS OF IMPLEMENTATION OF THE WORK PROGRAMME

GLOBAL STRATEGY FOR THE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE AGREEMENT ON CUSTOMS VALUATION

Resources allocation

Human resources

This activity is being completed. The Committee on Customs Valuation was informed of the progress made in this area in the first progress report submitted in October 2000.

In addition to the efforts being made at the domestic level, and in the framework of the efforts to train the officials directly concerned and responsible for implementing the internal reform process as a whole as well as the technical assistance programme concluded at the end of 1999 between Tunisia and the World Bank (G/VAL/W/62/Add.1), a customs training centre is currently being set up, and is scheduled to become operational in the second half of 2001. The purpose of this centre is to provide refresher courses and basic training for customs agents, and to train foreign trade operators.

Creation of a nucleus of experts and technicians specialized in customs valuation

Based on the experience of those countries that have implemented the Agreement on Customs Valuation and the recommendations of the World Customs Organization (WCO), a group has been set up within the Directorate-General of Customs. Supervised by a Controller-General, it comprises specialists in the four following areas:

- Legislation;
- inspection and control;
- informatics;
- training and reorientation.

Material resources

Tunisia is in the process of setting up a centre for customs research and documentation. The purpose of this centre is to disseminate information, carry out studies in the customs area and print customs documentation.

Tunisia considers that technical assistance in this area is needed to support the efforts being made to ensure that Tunisia has available the best means to enable it to implement its customs valuation commitments. This assistance will cover, *inter alia*, the furnishing of updated documentation setting out, for example, the interpretative notes to the valuation rules, adding practical examples or legal precedents so as to facilitate their application.

To that end, a request has been sent to the WTO Secretariat (Committee on Trade and Development) in accordance with the guidelines of the Three-Year Plan (2001-2003) of the Technical Cooperation Programme.

Computerized management of customs valuation and verification operations

Arabic language version of the SINDA system and development of bilingual programmes

Pursuant to Decree No. 97-2470 of 22 December 1997 on the single form, the Ministry of Finance, in an Order of 15 January 2001, established the new model for the computerized customs declaration. While the indications on the new declaration are in Arabic, the processing of the content of the declaration, and consequently the SINDA, remains in French. However, the new form required a new computer application and a change in configuration of the data input screens and the printing module. It is scheduled to be operational by April 2001.

Meanwhile, the process of conversion into Arabic of the customs declaration and the SINDA system continues.

Computer equipment and risk assessment programmes

As part of the programme for updating and improving the operation of the SINDA, an application that allows automatic targeting of shipments at risk has been set up. It is being further developed as the results obtained are evaluated.

Adapted tools: creation of a value index

As part of this activity, the competent customs services are currently drawing up a database on international prices for various products and services in international trade transactions within the period agreed. This computerized value index will provide all the customs departments responsible for verification at the local, regional and central levels with the necessary real-time information on international prices for products as part of the aid programme for post-entry verification.

In order to support the installation of this new system, Tunisia requests customs administrations that have experience in applying the Agreement on Customs Valuation to provide training so that all aspects of the Agreement can be mastered, particularly the form and content to be included in the value document (declaration of value) to be submitted by an applicant in support of the customs declaration of goods. An official request has been submitted to the WTO Secretariat (Committee on Trade and Development) in conformity with the guidelines of the Three-Year Plan (2001-2003) of the Technical Cooperation Programme.

IMPLEMENTATION OF SPECIFIC ACTIVITIES

Adaptation of domestic legislation

The draft text on customs valuation, which reflects the substance of the provisions of the Agreement on Customs Valuation, has been transmitted to the Chamber of Deputies.

Training and information

With the assistance of the National Customs School (END), a training programme on customs valuation for administrative officials, covering the period from 1 February to 31 May 2001, is currently under way. To date, 105 officials operating in the greater Tunis area have been able to attend. In the days to come, it will be extended to the four customs areas, where 25 officials will be trained per week.

In addition, information and awareness seminars on the Agreement on Customs Valuation will be organized for the different economic operators, with the assistance of all the interested parties (Administration, chambers of commerce, relevant employers' federations from the Tunisian Union for Industry, Commerce and Handicrafts). These seminars will cover the entire national territory and will involve the country's different regional economic hubs in the framework of the preparation for the entry into force of the Agreement for Tunisia.

To that end, a request has been submitted to the WTO Secretariat (Committee on Trade and Development) in conformity with the guidelines of the Three-Year Plan (2001-2003) of the Technical Cooperation Programme.
