



REPORT (2022) OF THE COUNCIL FOR TRADE IN GOODS

In accordance with the "Procedures for an Annual Overview of WTO Activities and for Reporting under the WTO" (WT/L/105), the Council for Trade in Goods (CTG, or the Council) is to prepare an annual report each year to the General Council on the activities in the Council as well as those in its subsidiary bodies. The reports are to be "factual in nature, containing an indication of actions and decisions taken, with cross-references to reports of subordinate bodies and could follow the model of the GATT 1947 Council reports to the CONTRACTING PARTIES".

Since its 2021 Annual Report (G/L/1418) was issued, the CTG met three times in formal session on the following dates: 21-22 April 2022 (G/C/M/142 and G/C/M/142/Add.1); 7-8 July 2022 (G/C/M/143); and 24-25 November 2022 (G/C/M/144¹). Furthermore, the CTG met twice in informal mode: on 23 May 2022 to consider the slate of names for the appointment of Chairpersons of the CTG's subsidiary bodies, and on 14 October 2022 to report on the Chairperson's consultations held to explore Members' views on three MC12 implementation matters and to seek Members' guidance on next steps. On 9 December 2022, the Council also held an information sharing session on the WTO's digital tools.

The subject matters raised and/or acted upon in the Council were as follows:

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1 ELECTION OF CHAIRPERSON OF THE COUNCIL FOR TRADE IN GOODS

1.1. At its meeting of 21 April, the Council elected by acclamation Mr Etienne Oudot de Dainville (France) as its Chairperson for 2022-2023.

2 APPOINTMENT OF OFFICERS FOR THE SUBSIDIARY BODIES OF THE COUNCIL

2.1. At its meeting of 21 April, the Council suspended this agenda item pending further consultations. Since Ambassador Purevsuren relinquished his post shortly after this meeting, the process of appointment of officers was subsequently conducted by the incoming Chairperson of the Council for Trade in Goods, Mr Etienne Oudot de Dainville.

2.2. The Council reverted to this agenda item on 23 May², when the Chairperson reported that consensus on the slate of names had been reached, and the Council of Trade in Goods agreed on the nominations of the following persons for election as Chairpersons of the subsidiary bodies of the Council for Trade in Goods for 2023:

3 MARKET ACCESS ISSUES

3.1 Decision on the Derestriction of the Uruguay Round Negotiating Materials

3.1. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council considered a draft decision on the Derestriction of the Uruguay Round Negotiating Materials. The Council approved the draft decision contained in document G/C/W/822 and recommended that it be forwarded to the General Council for adoption.

3.2 Collective waiver requests on the introduction of the Harmonized System 2002, 2007, 2012, and 2017

3.2. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council considered four requests for an extension of the collective waivers in connection with the introduction of Harmonized System 2002, 2007, 2012, and 2017 changes into WTO Schedules of Concessions. The Council approved the waiver extension requests and recommended that the draft decisions contained in documents G/C/W/815, G/C/W/816, G/C/W/817, and G/C/W/818 be forwarded to the General Council for adoption.

3.3 Draft waiver decision on the Introduction of Harmonized System 2022 Changes to Schedules of Concessions

3.3. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council considered a draft waiver decision on the Introduction of Harmonized System 2022 Changes to Schedules of Concessions. The Council approved the draft decision contained in document G/C/W/820 and recommended that it be forwarded to the General Council for adoption.

4 NOTIFICATION OF REGIONAL TRADE AGREEMENTS

4.1. At its meetings of 21 April, 7 July, and 24 November, the Council was informed of the following notifications of regional trade agreements:

5 STATUS OF NOTIFICATIONS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF THE AGREEMENTS IN ANNEX 1A OF THE WTO AGREEMENT (G/L/223/REV.29)

5.1. At its meeting of 21 April, the Council took note of document G/L/223/Rev.29, informing Members about the status of notifications under the provisions of the Agreements in Annex IA of the WTO Agreement. In addition, the Chairperson drew Members' attention to the Notifications Portal (<https://notifications.wto.org/en>), a new online system that had been developed by the Secretariat to provide detailed and up-to-date information on notifications, and which was based on this document.

6 ACCESSION OF THE REPUBLIC OF ARMENIA AND OF THE KYRGYZ REPUBLIC TO THE EURASIAN ECONOMIC UNION (EAEU): PROCEDURES UNDER ARTICLE XXVIII:3 OF THE GATT 1994

6.1 Accession of the Republic of Armenia to the Eurasian Economic Union: Procedures Under Article XXVIII:3 of the GATT 1994 – Communication from Armenia (G/L/1110/Add.8)

6.1. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council took note of the information provided by Armenia relating to its renegotiations under Article XXVIII:3 of GATT 1994, following its accession to the Eurasian Economic Union (EAEU), and considered the extension of the deadline set out in document G/L/1110/Add.8. The Council took note of the statements made by Armenia and approved the requested extension until 2 January 2024.

6.2 Accession of the Kyrgyz Republic to the Eurasian Economic Union: Procedures under Article XXVIII:3 of the GATT 1994 – Communication from the Kyrgyz Republic (G/L/1137/Add.7)

6.2. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council took note of the information provided by the Kyrgyz Republic relating to its renegotiations under Article XXVIII:3 of GATT 1994 following its accession to the EAEU and considered the extension of the deadline set out in document G/L/1137/Add.7. The Council took note of the statement made by the Kyrgyz Republic and approved the requested extension until 12 February 2024.

7 PROCEDURES UNDER ARTICLE XXVIII OF THE GATT 1994: WITHDRAWAL OF THE UNITED KINGDOM FROM THE EUROPEAN UNION (G/L/1385/ADD.2 AND G/L/1386/ADD.2)

7.1. At its meeting of 7 July, the European Union informed Members that it would extend for six months Members' rights to withdraw substantially equivalent concessions under Article XXVIII:3 of the GATT 1994, until 1 January 2023 (G/L/1385/Add.2), in connection with the withdrawal of the United Kingdom from the European Union. The Council took note of this statement.

7.2. Also at its meeting of 7 July, the United Kingdom informed Members that it would extend for six months Members' rights to withdraw substantially equivalent concessions under Article XXVIII:3 of the GATT 1994, until 1 January 2023, made in relation to the ongoing renegotiations on the establishment of the United Kingdom's Schedule of Concessions, following its withdrawal from the European Union⁴ (G/L/1386/Add.2). The Council took note of this statement.

8 MEASURES TO ALLOW GRADUATED LDCS, WITH GNP BELOW USD 1,000, BENEFITS PURSUANT TO ANNEX VII(B) OF THE AGREEMENT ON SUBSIDIES AND COUNTERVAILING MEASURES (WT/GC/W/742-G/C/W/752)

8.1. At its meeting of 21 April, the Council took note of the statements made by Chad, on behalf of the LDC Group, and supported by Angola, Bangladesh, India, Nepal, and Zambia, asking Members to consider the proposal to allow graduated LDC Members to benefit from the exception provided under Article 27.2(a) of the SCM Agreement to developing countries listed in Annex VII(b). The European Union requested additional information on the use of export subsidies by LDCs. The United States thanked the Secretariat for producing its Note "GNP Per Capita Calculations for All

WTO Members Using the Methodology in G/SCM/38" (G/SCM/W/585) with updated statistical information. The Secretariat remained available to discuss the information gaps identified.

8.2. At its meeting of 7 July, the Council took note of the statements made by Chad, on behalf of the LDC Group, and supported by Bangladesh, India, Nepal, and Nigeria, asking Members to consider the proposal to allow graduated LDC Members to benefit from the exception provided under Article 27.2(a) of the SCM Agreement to developing countries listed in Annex VII(b). Additional information was requested by the European Union in order to establish whether a transition period was needed for graduated LDCs. The United States noted information gaps that it wished to revisit in future discussions.

8.3. At its meeting of 24 November, the Council took note of the statement made by Bangladesh, on behalf of the LDC Group, renewing their request for Members to consider the proposal and reaffirming its rationale. The LDC Group also considered that the Secretariat's report, document G/SCM/W/585, which had recalculated the GNP per capita calculations for all Members, had demonstrated that some LDCs would still meet the relevant criteria even after graduation. The United States considered that the Secretariat's report confirmed that gaps remained in the information needed for the proposal to be workable from a technical perspective, and the European Union invited the LDCs to seek technical assistance from the Secretariat in order to notify the relevant information with a view to assessing the proposal.

9 TRADE CONCERNS

9.1. At its meeting of 21 April, 41 trade concerns were brought to the Council's attention, including the following 11 new trade concerns: (i) the Plurinational State of Bolivia's export restrictions on agricultural and hydrobiological products; (ii) Ecuador's import restrictions on grapes and onions; (iii) Panama's undue delays and export restrictions on agricultural and hydrobiological products; (iv) Nepal's import ban on energy drinks; (v) Nigeria's restrictive policies on agricultural products; (vi) the United States' discriminatory quantitative restriction on steel and/or aluminium imports; (vii) the European Union's (Belgium's) draft law introducing additional security measures for the provision of mobile 5G services; (viii) the Philippines' special safeguard on instant coffee; (ix) the United Kingdom's Environmental Act, forestry commodities; (x) the European Union's countervailing duties (CVD) on stainless steel cold-rolled flat (SSCR); and (xi) the unilateral trade restrictive measures against Russia by Australia, Canada, the European Union, Japan, New Zealand, Switzerland, the United Kingdom, and the United States. In addition, the discussion on the EU's Green Deal dealt with the anti-deforestation measures that had not been previously discussed. The full list of trade concerns considered at the 21 April CTG meeting is provided in Annex 1.

9.2. At its meeting of 7 July, 44 trade concerns were brought to the Council's attention, including the following three new trade concerns: (i) Australia's investigation and review of Anti-Dumping duties on A4 copy paper; (ii) Egypt's Halal certification requirements for imported food and beverage products; and (iii) Pakistan's import restrictions on foodstuffs and consumer goods. The full list of trade concerns considered at the 7 July CTG meeting is provided in Annex 2.

9.3. At its meeting of 24 November, 45 trade concerns were brought to the Council's attention, including the following nine new trade concerns: (i) the United States' trade distorting and discriminatory subsidies measures of the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 (request from China); (ii) the United States' series of disruptive policy measures on the global semiconductor industry chain and supply chain (request from China); (iii) Egypt's mandatory use of a Letter of Credit as payment condition for imports (request from the European Union); (iv) Viet Nam's anti-circumvention duty on sugar (request from Indonesia); (v) the Philippines' investigation of safeguard duty on high-density polyethylene (HDPE) products (request from Indonesia); (vi) the Russian Federation's market economy status in the United States' anti-dumping proceedings (request from the Russian Federation); (vii) the European Union's Draft Commission Regulation amending Annexes 2 and 5 to Regulation EC No. 396/2005 of the European Parliament and of the Council as regards to MRLs for clothianidin and thiamethoxam in or on certain products (request from the United States); (viii) China's Draft Recommended National Standard (GB/T) for office devices (Information Security Technology-Security Specification for Office Devices) (request from Japan); and (ix) China's Draft Revision of its Government Procurement Law (request from Japan). The full list of trade concerns considered at the 24 November CTG meeting is provided in Annex 3.

10 FUNCTIONING OF THE COUNCIL FOR TRADE IN GOODS AND ITS SUBSIDIARY BODIES

10.1. At its meeting of 21 April, the Council's Chairperson drew Members' attention to room document RD/CTG/15, which contained the latest version of the Annual Plan of Meetings for the CTG and its subsidiary bodies for the year 2022, and the information available for the year 2023. The document had been prepared in close coordination between the Secretary of the Goods Council and the Secretaries of the CTG subsidiary bodies, with the aim of avoiding overlaps and ensuring an optimal scheduling of meetings. He had also requested the Secretariat to prepare an update of this Annual Plan for each CTG meeting to facilitate identifying any potential issues at an early stage, while at the same time allowing the Membership to plan for meetings accordingly. At its meetings of 7 July and 24 November, the Chairperson provided updated information on the planning and organization of such meetings.⁵ At the latter, while welcoming the improvements that had been made over the past few years, some delegations expressed concern over the continued problems resulting from the reprogramming of meetings due to last minute changes in other bodies, which reduced predictability and made it difficult for smaller delegations to plan in advance. In particular, these delegations did not consider it appropriate for an important body such as the CTG to be obliged to meet until 9pm in one of its sessions. Finally, some Members requested the Secretariat to change the document symbol used to circulate the document with the tentative planning and organization of meetings (from an RD/CTG/ to a JOB/CTG/ document symbol).

11 MC12 IMPLEMENTATION MATTERS

11.1. At its meeting of 7 July, the Chairperson recalled the General Council's room document RD/WTO/13, which had been prepared by the Secretariat and distributed to Members in an attempt to list the elements in the implementation work of the Geneva Package to be carried out within the framework of the various WTO Councils and Committees. For his part, he had identified at least three elements that could have an impact on the work of the Goods Council, and referred to the possible work that the CTG may embark upon following the 12th WTO Ministerial Conference, namely: (i) the Work Programme on Electronic Commerce (WT/MIN(22)/32); (ii) the "Ministerial Declaration on the WTO Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic and Preparedness for Future Pandemics"⁶; and (iii) WTO reform.⁷ He noted that his doors remained open in case Members had suggestions regarding possible future work in these three areas. On 16 September, the Chairperson sent a communication inviting delegations to meet with him bilaterally to explore their views on whether the CTG should organize work in one or more of the three MC12 implementation matters that might require the Council's attention, and if so, how such work should be structured.

11.2. The Chairperson convened an informal meeting on 14 October to present the report of the consultations held between 22 September and 12 October, which was circulated prior to the meeting in document JOB/CTG/16. The concluding remarks by the Chairperson summarizing the outcome of the informal meeting were subsequently circulated in document JOB/CTG/17. Following this meeting, the Chairperson sent a communication to the Chairpersons of the CTG's 14 subsidiary bodies requesting them to prepare two reports, under their own responsibility and with the assistance of the Secretariat, concerning: (i) the activities that had been undertaken in their response to the pandemic; and (ii) the current functioning of their Committees, including actions taken in previous years to improve the Committee's functioning. This communication by the Chairperson was subsequently circulated to Members in document JOB/CTG/18.

11.3. At its meeting of 24 November, the Chairperson provided an update concerning his coordination with the Chairpersons and Secretaries of the CTG subsidiary bodies for the preparation of the above-mentioned reports, which he had suggested to share with Members for comments prior to their submission. He also noted that he would convene an informal meeting at the end of January 2023, or early in February 2023, to afford an opportunity to Chairpersons to present their reports, and to Members to discuss how to proceed with respect to these issues. Some Members requested to discuss adoption of the eAgenda as one possible improvement that could be implemented by the CTG in its work.
