À sa réunion du 30 juillet 2020, le Conseil des ADPIC est convenu d'inviter les organisations intergouvernementales ayant le statut d'observateur au Conseil à actualiser les renseignements concernant leurs programmes de coopération technique et financière en rapport avec la mise en œuvre de l'Accord sur les ADPIC.

Le présent document reproduit les renseignements que la Conférence des Nations Unies sur le commerce et le développement (CNUCED) a fournis dans une communication datée du 22 septembre 2020.

1 INTRODUCTION

Travaux de la CNUCED dans le domaine des droits de propriété intellectuelle et du développement

1. Le Secrétariat de la CNUCED met en œuvre, par les soins de son Unité de la propriété intellectuelle qui est rattachée à la Division de l'investissement et des entreprises, un programme de travail sur la dimension développement des droits de propriété intellectuelle (DPI). Ce programme de travail vise à donner suite au mandat reçu des Membres lors de la Conférence ministérielle de Nairobi (juillet 2016), ainsi qu'aux demandes intergouvernementales au titre du Plan d'action de l'Organisation mondiale de la propriété intellectuelle (OMPI) pour le développement et de la Résolution 61.21 de l'Assemblée mondiale de la santé sur la stratégie et le plan d'action mondiaux pour la santé publique, l'innovation et la propriété intellectuelle. Il est financé en partie par des institutions et des gouvernements donateurs. Actuellement, le programme de travail porte sur l'assistance technique et le renforcement des capacités dans des domaines concernant: 1) la production locale de produits pharmaceutiques et ses liens avec la COVID-19 ainsi que la résistance aux agents antimicrobiens; 2) le protocole relatif à la propriété intellectuelle dans le cadre de la zone de libre-échange continentale africaine; 3) le rôle de la propriété intellectuelle dans les partenariats en matière de technologie et de R&D; et 4) le rôle de la propriété intellectuelle dans l'économie numérique.
