Dear Mr. Chairman:

Pursuant to the provisions of paragraph 8 of Article 11 of the Arrangement, and further to the July 31 interim report by the U.S. to the Textiles Surveillance Body, I have been instructed by my government to inform the TSB as follows:

- (a) The United States is rescinding the restraints on categories 445 and 446 as recommended by the TSB at its 12th meeting of 1984. The effective date will be 19 September, 1984.
- (b) The United States is not, however, able to follow the recommendation to rescind the restraint on Category 334 for the reasons set out in paragraph 2 below
 - (c) The government of India has been so informed.
- 2. Since the date of the TSB's recommendation, and the presentations by the U.S. and Indian Delegations which preceded it, official U.S. census data with respect to U.S. 1983 domestic production in category 334 have become available. These data indicate that domestic production is substantially lower than the estimate provided by the U.S. delegation to the TSB at the twelfth session. Furthermore, imports in category 334 have continued to increase from India as well as other sources. Under these circumstances, the United States believes that imports from India continue to pose real risk of market disruption

in this category.

3. Attached hereto is an annex which provides detailed and up-dated information with respect to the market situation for this category.

INDIA: Cotton Other Coats

Category 334

Product Description

A. <u>Category 334, Men's and Boys' Other Coats includes:</u> all cotton coats and jackets except suit and suit-type coats. These "other coats" have a full-front opening, sleeves, cover at least the upper part of the body and are generally worn over other garments. Topcoats, parkas, suburban car coats, warm-up and work-type jackets, raincoats, and vests with attachable sleeves are some of the styles included in this category.

II. Market Situation

A. Real Risk of Market Disruption

1. Market Share Loss (See Table I)

The domestic market for men's and boys' other cotton coats was 1,822,000 dozen in 1983, 2 percent lower than in 1979. In between these years, the market fluctuated somewhat, but the U.S. producers' share of this market declined fairly steadily from 67 percent in 1979 to 47 percent in 1982 and sharply to 37 percent in 1983.

Approximately 90 percent of the coats imported in this category are fabricated from woven fabrics and the loss of market by U.S. producers of these coats has also been dramatic. The U.S. producers' share of this market has declined each year since 1979, falling from a 70 percent share in 1979 to 39 percent in 1983.

U.S. domestic production of Category 334 declined 46 percent during 1979-1983, totaling 670,000 dozen in the latter year. The decline is even more evident when compared with earlier periods such as during 1973-1976 when U.S.

production averaged 3,000,000 dozen annually. In contrast, imports averaged 425,000 dozen annually during the 1973-1976 period compared with 617,000 dozen in 1979 and 1,152,000 dozen in 1983.

2. Import Penetration (See Tables II and III)

Table II demonstrates the sharp and substantial increase in imports since 1979, at which time imports were about half the 1983 levels. In addition, domestic production declined during this period. As a result, the import to production ratio rose from 49.4 percent in 1979 to 171.9 percent in 1983.

3. Employment

Employment in the industry producing these men's and boy's cotton coats declined 15 percent during 1979-1983. In the latter year, these industries employed 33,100 production workers.

4. Profits

Apparel industry profits as a percent of sales were 3.4 percent in 1983, down from 4.6 percent in 1979.

B. Sharp and Substantial Increase in Imports

1. Imports (General) (See Table IV)

U.S. imports of Category 334 were 1,263,667 dozen during the year ending July 1984, 22 percent higher than the previous 12 months. In addition, these imports increased 25 percent in 1983 compared with 1982. These imports totaled 1,152,000 dozen in 1983, the highest level on record and nearly three times greater than the annual average during 1973-1976.

Woven coats, Category 334 pt., accounted for virtually all the import growth in the first seven months of 1984. In addition, these imports have increased each year since 1979 while domestic production of Category 334 pt. declined each of those years. Category 334 pt. imports in all of 1983, at 1,028,000 dozen, were 21 percent above the previous year's level. During the year ending July 1984, these imports reached 1,147,970 dozen, which is 22 percent higher than the previous twelve months.

2. Imports (India) (See Table VI)

Category 334 imports from India more than doubled from 12,274 dozen in 1982 to 29,655 dozen in 1983. Year ending July 1984 imports reached 34,462 dozen, 71 percent higher than the previous twelve months. In addition, January to July 1984 imports, at 22,608 dozen, if annualized, would exceed 1983 totals by 31 percent. Virtually all of these imports were cotton woven coats (Category 334 Pt.)

D. Values and Prices 'See Table VI)

The landed unit prices of Category 334 coats from India have been among the lowest of the foreign suppliers. The landed prices were well below the U.S. producer prices for comparable garments.




