### U.S. SUBMISSION 15 April 1985

TURKEY: Spun Plied Acrylic Yarn Category 604 Part

#### I. General Market Situation:

As shown in Table II of the U.S. Submission of 25 February 1985, U.S. producers' share of the domestic market fell from 82.6 percent in 1979 to 63.6 percent in 1984. During this same period, imports in Category 604 part rose from 8.9 million pounds in 1979 to 21.7 million in 1983 and then declined slightly to 20.4 million pounds in 1984.

Data for January 1984 snows that the severity of the problem for domestic producers is accelerating rapidly. Average weekly production in January 1985 was down 35 percent from the same month a year ago. This is the largest year-to-year drop in production record.

### II. Import Situation

As shown in Table IV of the 25 February submission, imports of category 604 part from Turkey increased from zero in 1983 to 1,979,663 pounds in 1984. Total imports for the 12-month periods ending in January and February 1985 were 20,122,018 and 19,017,973, respectively. Data on imports from Turkey and on imports from other sources are reflected in the attached up-dated versions of Tables III and IV of the 25 February submission.

## III. Consultations

With respect to the statement in the April report by Turkey to the TSB (Tex.SB/1098) that the two sides "agreed to request the TSB to proceed to a detailed examination of the case," the U.S. understanding is somewhat different. It was (and is) the U.S. view that,

if no agreement can be reached between the U.S. and Turkey with respect to imports of category 604 part, the issue must once again be addressed by the TSB. That is not quite the same as saying that the two parties agreed to request the TSB to do so, although the U.S. does agree that it is certainly appropriate.

With respect to the U.S. offer of 525,000 pounds (an increase of more than 10 percent above the article three level), we would note that Turkey's first formal offer was 3.2 million pounds. A level of two million pounds was later suggested informally and subsequently confirmed as a formal offer via diplomatic channels. The U.S. view is, and Turkey was so informed, that these levels are far beyond a possible negotiating range for the United States. Thus, while the U.S. remains ready and willing to continue consultations, the current levels proposed by Turkey are not such as to move the consultations forward.

The two parties have also explored the possibilities of concluding a more broadly based bilateral agreement on textiles, but these discussions have not yet produced mutual agreement.

### Conclusion:

The U.S. Government believes that imports of Category 604 part from Turkey have caused market disruption and that a restraint is fully justified under the MFA. The U.S. remains willing to continue consultations in an effort to reach a mutually agreeable solution on a level of restraint.
