
Note by the Chairman

Attached is a notification received from the United States of a twelve-month extension of the restraint on Category 342/642 (skirts) when imported from Turkey. This extension was made pursuant to paragraph 8 of the 1986 Protocol of Extension.

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Dear Ambassador Raffaelli:

I am instructed by my government to inform the Textiles Surveillance Body of the absence of agreement between the Government of the United States and the Government of Turkey on extension of existing restraint level for cotton and mmf skirts (category 342/642) in accordance with paragraph 8 of Article 3 of the Arrangement. The Government of the United States, therefore, has the honor to inform the Textiles Surveillance Body of its intention to invoke paragraph 8 of the 1986 Protocol of Extension with respect to imports of this product. The Government of Turkey was notified of this decision through the Embassy of Turkey in Washington, D.C. on May 20 (copy attached).

In a letter dated May 3, 1988, in accordance with paragraph 8 of Article 3 of the Arrangement, the Government of the United States proposed extending the existing restraint level for Category 342/642 for an additional year, with six percent growth, i.e., at a level of 126,723 dozen. At that time, the Government of the United States also informed the Government of Turkey that the United States would be pleased to hold additional consultations on this matter at a mutually convenient time. On May 9, 1988 the Government of Turkey sent a note to the Embassy of the United States in Ankara which did not agree to the proposed extension. In the absence of

agreement on extension of the restraint level the Government of the United States has notified the Government of Turkey of its intent to invoke paragraph 8 of the 1986 Protocol. The Government of the United States also reaffirmed its willingness to hold additional consultations on this matter, with a view to reaching a negotiated solution.

The Secretary of State presents his compliments to His Excellency the Ambassaodr of Turkey and refers to the Arrangement Regarding International Trade in Textiles, done at Geneva on December 20, 1973 and extended by the protocol done at Geneva on July 31, 1986, hereinafter referred to as "the Arrangement", and to the Agreement between the United States of America and the Republic of Turkey on Bilateral Textile Trade of October 18, 1985, and subsequently amended. The Secretary of State also refers to consultations held October 14-16, 1987 in Geneva and January 13-15, 1988 in Washington, D.C., as well as informal discussions in February, March and April of 1988, between representatives of the Governments of Turkey and the United States concerning exports of cotton and man-made fiber skirts (category 342/642) from Turkey to the United States.

The Secretary of State further refers to the letter dated May 3, 1988, in which the Government of the United States informed the Government of Turkey of its desire to extend the existing restraint level for cotton and man-made fiber skirts (category 342/642) for an additional year at a level of 126,723 dozen, which represents six percent growth over the previous restraint. At that time, the Government of the United States noted that it was making this proposal in order to avoid the disruptive effects of a sudden increase in imports of this product and to ensure the steady and orderly development of

trade. In accordance with paragraph 8 of Article 3 of the Arrangement, the Government of the United States requested confirmation that extension of this restraint was acceptable to the Government of Turkey.

On May 9, 1988 the Government of Turkey informed the Embassy of the United States in Ankara that the Government of Turkey did not agree to the United States' proposal to extend this restraint. Inasmuch as the existing restraint level will expire on May 26, 1988 and the Government of Turkey has not agreed to an extension of this restraint, the Government of the United States has the honor to inform the Government of Turkey of its intent to invoke paragraph 8 of the 1986 protocol of extension of the Arrangement. This action is being taken to ensure the steady and orderly development of trade and to avoid the exacerbation of market disruption which would occur as a result of an imminent and measurable increase in imports of this product from Turkey upon expiration of the existing restraint. Approximately 53,000 dozen cotton and man-made fiber skirts from Turkey are currently in embargo in the United States, in addition to the 93,716 dozen (above the existing restraint level of 119,550 dozen), which entered the United States during the current restraint period. This sudden increase in imports would certainly further exacerbate the situation of market disruption which exists in the United States market for this product.

In accordance, therefore, with the provisions of paragraph 8 of the 1986 protocol, the restraint for cotton and man-made fiber skirts (category 342/642) will be extended for an additional year with six percent growth. The extension of the restraint will take effect on May 27, 1988 and will be at a level of 126,723 dozen. It will remain in effect through May 26, 1989.

A detailed factual statement of the reasons and justifications for this action, with current supporting data, is appended as Annex A, which is to be regarded as an integral part of this note.

As the Government of the United States informed the Government of Turkey in its letter of May 3, the Government of the United States would be pleased to hold additional consultations on this matter when our two Governments meet again in Turkey June 1-3.

Summary and Conclusions

Turkey was called on cotton and man-made fiber skirts (Category 342/642) in May 1987. Following a failure to reach a negotiated solution to this matter a restraint level of 119,550 dozen was imposed for the period May 27, 1987 through May 26, 1988. Turkey's imports reached a peak 433,556 dozen for the calendar year 1987. This level was seven times Turkey's previous year's trade, three and one half times the restraint level, and accounted for five percent of total Category 342/642 imports. Turkey's goods were embargoed on November 20, 1987; through the end of February 1987, 53,029 dozen of Turkey's cotton and man-made fiber skirts were embargoed. As a result of the embargo, Turkey's year ending import level fell steadily dropping to 363,621 dozen for the year ending March 1988, still three times the annual restraint level. In the absence of restraints, indications are that there will once again be a sharp and substantial increase in imports of cotton and man-made fiber skirts (Category 342/642) from Turkey.

The U.S. market for cotton and man-made fiber skirts (Category 342/642) has been disrupted by imports. The removal of restraints and the resulting imminent and measurable increase in imports of cotton and man-made fiber skirts from Turkey would exacerbate the market disruption and impede the steady and orderly development of trade.

U.S. Production and Market Share

U.S. production of cotton and man-made fiber skirts has been on the decline, dropping from 9,101 thousand dozen in 1982 to a depressed 7,940 thousand dozen average during 1984 and 1985, a decline of 13 percent. Production in 1986 recovered slightly, reaching 8,126 thousand dozen, but fell again in 1987 to a level of 8,017 thousand dozen, 12 percent below the 1982 level.

The domestic manufacturers' share of the market dropped 34 percentage points in just five years, falling from 83 percent in 1982 to 49 percent in 1987.

U.S. Imports and Import Penetration

U.S. imports of cotton and man-made fiber skirts (Category 342/642) have increased steadily since 1982, increasing from 1,818 thousand dozen in 1982 to 8,285 thousand dozen in 1987, an average annual rate of 37 percent. During the first three months of 1988, imports of cotton and man-made fiber skirts (Category 342/642) reached 2,654 thousand dozen, 14 percent above the level imported during the same period in 1987. The ratio of imports to domestic production increased fivefold, rising from 20 percent in 1982 to 103 percent in 1987.

Duty-Paid Value and U.S. Producers' Price

The majority of Turkey's cotton and man-made fiber skirt imports enter under the following TSUSA numbers: 384.3444 -- women's and girls' cotton knit skirts, not ornamented; 384.5251 -- women's cotton woven skirts, not of corduroy, denim or velveteen, not ornamented; and 384.9445 -- women's man-made fiber woven skirts, not ornamented. These skirts entered the U.S. at landed duty-paid values below U.S. producers' prices for comparable skirts.
