This is to confirm my oral notification that, effective September 16, 1992, the United States invoked the provisions of article 3.5 of the MFA to impose restraints on imports of cotton and mmf shirts (category 340/640) from Guatemala. The restraint period is from June 22, 1992 to June 21, 1993. The restraint level is set at 798,980 dozen.

4. (BEGIN TEXT OF NOTE)

(COMPLIMENTARY OPENING) AND HAS THE HONOR TO REFER TO THE ARRANGEMENT REGARDING INTERNATIONAL TRADE IN TEXTILES, WITH ANNEXES, DONE AT GENEVA ON DECEMBER 20, 1973, AND FXTENDED BY PROTOCOL ADOPTED ON JULY 31, 1991 AT GENEVA (THE ARRANGEMENT).

DURING RECENT MONTHS, THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES HAS NOTED THE RAPIDLY INCREASING LEVELS OF IMPORTS OF CATEGORY 340/640 (MEN'S AND BOYS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FER WOVEN SHIRTS) FROM GUATEMALA. AFTER CAREFUL REVIEW, THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES HAS CONCLUDED THAT THESE IMPORTS FROM GUATEMALA ARE CAUSING DISRUPTION OF THE MARKET FOR THESE PRODUCTS IN THE UNITED STATES. DETAILED TUAL STATEMENTS OF THE REASONS AND JUSTIFICATIONS FOR THIS CONCLUSION ARE ATTACHED AS ANNEX A AND ARE AN INTEGRAL PART OF THIS DIPLOMATIC NOTE.

IN ORDER TO AVOID FURTHER MARKET DISRUPTION, THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES HEREBY REQUESTS CONSULTATIONS WITH THE GOVERNMENT OF GUATEMALA TO DISCUSS

THE APPROPRIATE LEVEL OF RESTRAINT FOR GUATEMALAN EXPORTS OF MEN'S AND BOYS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN SHIRTS, CATEGORY 340/640, TO THE UNITED STATES.

THIS REQUEST FOR CONSULTATIONS IS BEING TAKEN PURSUANT TO ARTICLE 3 OF THE ARRANGEMENT.

IF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUATEMALA AND THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES ARE NOT ABLE TO AGREE ON A MUTUALLY SATISFACTORY SOLUTION TO THIS MATTER WITHIN SIXTY DAYS FROM THE RECEIPT OF THIS NOTE, THE GOVERNMENT OF THE UNITED STATES RESERVES ITS RIGHT TO RESTRAIN SUCH IMPORTS PRODUCED IN GUATEMALA AND EXPORTED TO THE UNITED STATES DURING THE TWELVE MONTH PERIOD BEGINNING ON THE DATE OF THE GOVERNMENT OF GUATEMALA'S RECEIPT OF THIS NOTE. A 12 MONTH SPECIFIC LIMIT WILL PE CALCULATED ON THE BASIS OF THE LEVELS OF UNITED STATES IMPORTS OF PRODUCTS IN ATEGORY 340/640 REPORTED IN U.S. GENERAL IMPORT TATISTICS DURING THE FIRST TWELVE OF THE MOST RECENT FOURTEEN MONTHS PRECEDING THE MONTH IN WHICH THIS REQUEST WAS MADE. FOR CATEGORY 340/640, THIS LIMIT WOULD BE 100 DOZEN, BASED ON THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1992. FORMULATION IS IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF ARTICLE THREE OF THE MULTIFIBER ARRANGEMENT. (COMPLIMENTARY CLOSE)

GUATEMALA MEN'S AND POTS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIFER WOVEN SHIRTS CATEGORY 340/640 MARCH 1992

IMPORT SITUATION AND CONCLUSION

U.S. IMPORTS OF MEN'S AND BOYS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER VEN SHIRTS, CATEGORY 340/640, FROM GUATEMALA REACHED 798,980 IN THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1992, 68 PERCENT ABOVE THE 474,954 DOZEN IMPORTED DURING THE YEAR ENDING IN MARCH 1991. DURING THE FIRST THREE MONTHS OF 1992, IMPORTS OF CATEGORY 340/640 FROM GUATEMALA SURGED TO 257,310 DOZEN, ALMOST 3 TIMES THE 93,289 DOZEN IMPORTED DURING THE SAME PERIOD A YEAR EARLIER.

THE SHARP AND SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN CATEGORY 340/640

IMPORTS FROM GUATEMALA IS CAUSING DISRUPTION IN THE U.S. MARKET FOR MEN'S AND POYS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN ' SHIRTS.

U.S. PRODUCTION, IMPORT PENETRATION AND MARKET SHARE

U.S. PRODUCTION OF MEN'S AND BOY'S COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN SHIRTS, CATEGORY 340/640, DECLINED 28 PERCENT, FALLING FROM 16, 401, 000 DOZEN IN 1988 TO 11,797,000 DOZEN U.S. IMPORTS OF MEN'S AND BOYS COTTON AND IN 1991. MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN SHIRTS, CATEGORY 340/640 DECLINED IN 1990 AND 1991. HOWEVER, CATEGORY 340/640 IMPORTS SURGED IN 1992, REACHING 7,155,498 DOZEN IMPORTED DURING THE FIRST THREE MONTHS OF 1992, 26 PERCENT ABOVE THE LEVEL MPORTED DURING THE JANUARY-MARCH 1991 PERIOD. IF CATEGORY 340/640 IMPORTS CONTINUE TO GROW AT THIS RATE. THEY WILL REACH A RECORD 28,620,000 DOZEN IN CALENDAR YEAR 1992.

THE RATIO OF IMPORTS TO DOMESTIC PRODUCTION INCREASED FROM 157 PERCENT IN 1988 TO 203 PERCENT IN 1991, WHILE THE DOMESTIC MANUFACTURERS' SHARE OF THE MARKET FOR MEN'S AND COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN SHIRTS FELL FROM 39 PERCENT IN 1988 TO 33 PERCENT IN 1991. IF IMPORTS CONTINUE TO INCREASE AT THEIR CURRENT RATE OF GROWTH AND DOMESTIC PRODUCTION REMAINS AT THE 1991 LEVEL. THE RATIO OF IMPORTS TO DOMESTIC PRODUCTION WOULD INCREASE TO 243 PERCENT AND THE DOMESTIC MANUFACTURERS' SHARE OF THE MARTET FOR MEN'S AND POYS' COTTON AND MAN-MADE FIBER WOVEN SHIRTS WOULD FALL TO 29 PERCENT IN 1992.

DUTY-PAID VALUE AND U.S. PRODUCERS' PRICE

APPROXIMATELY 74 PERCENT OF CATEGORY 340/640 IMPORTS FROM GUATEMALA DURING THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1992 ENTERED THE U.S. UNDER THE HTSUSA NUMBERS 6205.20.2025 - MEN'S COTTON ESS SHIRTS, OTHER THAN YARN DYED, 6205.20.2050 -- MEN'S ARN DIED COTTON SHIRTS THAT ARE NOT NAPPED, AND NOT CORDUROY, 6205.20.2065 -- OTHER MEN'S COTTON SHIRTS, OTHER THAN YARN DYED, AND 6205.20.2075 -- OTHER BOYS' COTTON SHIRTS. THESE SHIRTS ENTERED THE U.S. AT LANDED DUTY-PAID VALUES BELOW U.S. PRODUCERS' PRICES FOR COMPARABLE SHIRTS.
