UPDATE ON THE OPERATION OF THE STANDARDS AND TRADE DEVELOPMENT FACILITY

NOTE BY THE SECRETARIAT¹

1 OVERVIEW

- 1.1. The Standards and Trade Development Facility (STDF) supports developing countries in building their capacity to implement international SPS standards, guidelines and recommendations as a means to improve their human, animal and plant health status and ability to gain and maintain access to markets. In doing so, it contributes to sustainable economic growth, poverty reduction, food security and environmental protection in developing countries. More specifically, the STDF increases awareness, mobilizes additional resources, strengthens collaboration and identifies and disseminates good practice to enhance the effectiveness of SPS assistance. The STDF also provides support and funding for the development and implementation of projects that promote compliance with international SPS requirements.
- 1.2. The STDF is a global partnership established by the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE), the World Bank, the World Health Organization (WHO) and the World Trade Organization (WTO). Other organizations involved in SPS-related technical cooperation, donors contributing funds to the STDF and developing country experts participate actively in the Facility's work. The STDF is managed and housed by the WTO.²
- 1.3. This document provides an overview of STDF activities in support of its work programme since the previous SPS Committee meeting in March 2013, as well as information on planned activities. The Annex provides an overview of on-going STDF projects and project preparation grants (PPGs). The STDF recently issued its 2012 Annual Report, which is available on the STDF website (http://www.standardsfacility.org/Files/AnnualReports/STDF_AnnualReport_2012.pdf).
- 1.4. The STDF regularly issues an e-newsletter which contains an overview of major developments in the area of SPS capacity building, including activities of the STDF and its partners.

2 COORDINATION AND INFORMATION DISSEMINATION

2.1 International Trade and Invasive Alien Species

2.1. In July 2012, the STDF organized a seminar on the relationship between international trade and invasive alien species (IAS), and the linkages between the international organizations and legal instruments concerned. The seminar was successful in raising awareness about the mutually-beneficial goals of the SPS Agreement and the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), and the contribution of two relevant standard-setting organizations (the IPPC and the OIE) under the SPS Agreement. In particular, participants highlighted the importance of: (i) effective SPS systems in

helping to protect against the entry of harmful species, including pests, diseases and other IAS; and (ii) collaboration between the SPS and the CBD "communities" at the global, regional and national level. Information on the seminar, including the presentations, a short two-page STDF briefing note and other relevant documentation, is available on the STDF website (http://www.standardsfacility.org/en/TAIAS.htm).

- 2.2. In May 2013, the STDF finalized the background study that was presented at the seminar and subsequently revised based on the discussions and conclusions of the seminar. The study reviews and analyses key concepts and principles relevant to IAS and international trade in the context of the SPS Agreement and the CBD, and in relation to the IPPC and the OIE. It also considers various initiatives to enhance capacities for managing the entry and spread of IAS (including plant pests and animal diseases), reviews common challenges and good practices, and makes a number of targeted recommendations.
- 2.3. The STDF Secretariat will present the main findings, conclusions and recommendations of the study during a side-event, in collaboration with the IPPC and OIE, on **Thursday 27 June 2013 (14:00-15:00, Room E)**. Interested delegates are most welcome to attend the side-event. Copies of the study will be made available.

2.2 Multi Criteria Decision Analysis (MCDA)

- 2.4. The STDF continued its work on the application of Multi Criteria Decision Analysis (MCDA) to inform decision-making on SPS capacity building and public, private and/or donor resource allocation. Application of the MCDA framework can help to: (i) enhance the economic efficiency of SPS resource allocation decisions so that scarce resources are allocated in a manner that best meets a country's economic development, poverty alleviation, public health and/or other objectives; (ii) promote more transparent and accountable choices between multiple investment options; and (iii) facilitate dialogue and coordination among public and private sector stakeholders and encourage more inclusive decision-making processes.
- 2.5. On 24-25 June 2013, the STDF will organize a workshop in Geneva for its partner organizations and selected participants from developing countries where the MCDA tool has been applied. Participation in this workshop is upon invitation only and registration is now closed. The objectives of the workshop will be to: (i) review the work to date on the use of MCDA to inform SPS-decision-making in several developing countries; (ii) discuss options to improve and refine the MCDA tool and its practical application; and (iii) make recommendations to guide future work on MCDA. 2.3 Fourth Global Review of Aid for Trade

- 2.6. The Fourth Global Review of Aid for Trade will be held at the WTO from 8-10 July 2013. The aim of the Global Review is to examine strategies to connect developing country and least-developed country (LDC) firms to international value chains.³ Delegates are reminded that registration for the Global Aid for Trade Review is mandatory (http://www.wto.org/english/tratop_e/devel_e/a4t_e/gr13_registration_e.htm). The deadline for registration is **21 June 2013**.
- 2.7. The STDF, in collaboration with Canada and the Netherlands, will hold a side-event entitled "Public Private Partnerships in a Value Chain Context" on **Tuesday 9 July 2013 (15:00–17:00, Room S3)**. This event will be used to disseminate the results of recent STDF work on SPS-related public-private partnerships⁴ and to present a report prepared by the Canadian North-South Institute entitled "Models for Trade-Related Private Sector Partnerships for Development". The presentations will be followed by a panel discussion among senior public and private sector experts who will address in particular the following questions:
 - What is the role and potential of PPPs in helping developing countries connect to value chains? What have been the experiences, challenges, innovations and results?

- What role can and should different types of stakeholders (governments, private sector, development partners, etc.) play in facilitating PPPs in the context of connecting to value chains?
- How can the longer-term sustainability of PPPs that seek the inclusion of smallholders in agricultural value chains be ensured

2.4 SPS and Trade Facilitation

2.9. The STDF started implementation of research work in selected countries in Asia that will analyse the implementation of SPS measures in the context of trade facilitation (defined as the simplification, harmonisation, standardisation and modernisation of trade procedures). The aim is to identify, analyse and foster dialogue on experiences, lessons and good practices to improve the implementation of SPS controls in a way that facilitates safe trade. Research is also planned in selected countries in Africa and Latin America, in collaboration with STDF partners and other interested organizations, including the Inter-American Development Bank (IDB) and TradeMark Southern Africa.

2.5 STDF Virtual Library

2.10. The STDF Secretariat continues to add relevant SPS capacity building documents to the STDF Virtual Library (http://www.stdfvirtuallibrary.org) to facilitate the exchange of information and sharing of experiences, identify and disseminate good practice and enhance the effectiveness of SPS-related technical co-operation. Delegates are encouraged to share project documents, end reports, training materials, project evaluations reports, SPS needs assessments, cost-benefit analyses, research papers and articles, etc. (STDFSecretariat@wto.org).

2.6 SPS technical cooperation and impacts on domestic food safety

2.11. The STDF, in collaboration with the FAO and the WHO, would like to commission a study on the spill-over effects of export-oriented SPS technical cooperation projects/programmes on the domestic health situation. One aim will be to draw key lessons to improve the design and delivery of future SPS-related projects and programmes. This study will primarily be based on a review of selected projects and programmes implemented by STDF partners and donors and comprise desk research, questionnaires and direct interviews. 3 PROJECT DEVELOPMENT

- 3.1. The STDF provides advice and support to beneficiaries on issues related to SPS project development and finances project preparation grants (PPGs) to assist beneficiaries in the articulation of their SPS needs and the development of technically sound and sustainable project proposals. Seed funding up to US\$50,000 is available for PPGs, which can be used for any of the following purposes (or a combination thereof): (i) application of SPS-related capacity evaluation and prioritization tools; (ii) preparation of feasibility studies that precede project development to assess the potential impact and economic viability of proposals (expected costs and benefits); and/or (iii) preparation of project proposals that can be funded by the STDF or other donors.
- 3.2. A total of **56** PPGs have been approved and funded by the STDF since its inception. The STDF Working Group may approve additional PPGs for funding at its next meeting on 15-16 October 2013.

4 PROJECT FUNDING

4.1. Project grant financing up to a maximum of US\$1,000,000 is available from the STDF. Favourable consideration is given to projects that focus on one or more of the following: (i) the

identification, development and dissemination of good practice in SPS-related technical cooperation, including the development and application of innovative and replicable approaches; (ii) STDF work on cross-cutting topics of common interest; (iii) the use of regional approaches to address SPS constraints; and/or (iv) collaborative and interdisciplinary approaches focused on the interface/linkages between human, animal and plant health and trade, and benefiting from the involvement of two or more STDF partners or other relevant organizations.

- 4.2. A total of 65 projects have been approved for STDF funding since its inception. The STDF Working Group may approve additional projects for funding at its next meeting on 15-16 October 2013.




Figure 1: STDF projects and PPGs (US\$)

- 4.3. The Annex provides an overview of on-going STDF projects and PPGs. Since its inception, the STDF has devoted 40% of its project and PPG resources to Least-developed countries (LDCs) and Other Low Income Countries (OLICs), as shown in Figure 1 below. Hence, the STDF continues to meet its target to devote at least 40% of its project and PPG resources to LDCs and OLICs. However, as also indicated in the 2012 Annual Report, this percentage has dropped slowly over the last years (from 54% in 2009 to 40% in 2013). This trend merits attention in the near future. The allocation of PPG resources to LDCs and OLICs remains high (i.e. 66% of the overall budget for PPGs).




Figure 2: STDF Projects and PPGs (number)

4.4. Figure 2 below indicates that 52% of the number of STDF projects and PPGs has gone to Sub-Saharan Africa, 17% to Asia, and 17% to Latin America and the Caribbean. In addition, 11% of STDF projects and PPGs can be classified as global.

4.5. Applications for STDF funding can be made at any point in the year but should be received at least 60 working days in advance of each Working Group meeting in order to be considered at that meeting. The next deadline for the submission of applications is **19 July 2013**.
