In the context of the Fifth Review of the Operation and Implementation of the *Agreement on the Application of Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures* (SPS Agreement), Belize submitted a proposal for the Committee on Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SPS Committee) to consider holding a thematic session on voluntary third-party assurance programmes.¹ At the July 2019 meeting, the SPS Committee agreed to the proposal and to hold the thematic session in March 2020. After its suspension due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the SPS Committee agreed to hold the thematic session in November 2020.

The session will cover voluntary third-party assurance as part of national SPS control systems, with the main objectives to: receive updates from the international standard-setting bodies on their work in the area; facilitate an exchange of information among Members on their use of voluntary third-party assurance as part of national SPS control systems; obtain the perspectives and experiences of the private sector; and learn about capacity-building initiatives in this area.

Further to Belize's proposal, Members were invited to submit any inputs on the programme and speakers by 29 November 2019. This programme is based on the structure suggested by Belize.²

The thematic session will be held in Geneva, Switzerland, on Tuesday, 3 November 2020, starting at $\underline{10:00}$, and continuing in the afternoon at $\underline{15:00}$, as necessary. The thematic session will take place at the WTO and can also be attended virtually through the Interprefy platform.
