MEASURES CONCERNING PHYTOSANITARY CERTIFICATES AIMED AT THE FACILITATION OF TRADE IN VIEW OF ISSUES ARISING FROM THE COVID-19 PANDEMIC

COMMUNICATION FROM MEXICO

The following communication, dated 23 April 2020, is being circulated at the request of the delegation of <u>Mexico</u>.

In light of the COVID-19 international epidemiological emergency and in order to facilitate trade in these circumstances, the National Agri-Food Health, Safety and Quality Service (SENASICA) of Mexico, through the Directorate-General of Plant Health, ruled that, from 27 March 2020, shipments of products and by-products of plant origin requiring the submission of an original phytosanitary certificate may enter the country as follows:

- 1. The interested party must send a copy of the phytosanitary certificate to officials at the relevant Agricultural Health Inspection Office (OISA). This certificate must correspond with the indications from the countries of origin of the goods.
- 2. Currently, this applies to shipments of products and by-products of plant origin from Ecuador, Costa Rica, the Netherlands, the United States, Chile and Member States of the European Union. However, any country may request this option from SENASICA.
- 3. The interested party must send a letter of commitment to the relevant OISA, in which it undertakes to send the original phytosanitary certificate 15 days after the end of the COVID-19 emergency is declared in the country of origin.

For its part, SENASICA's Directorate-General of Animal Health has ruled that, for the importation into Mexico of livestock, aquaculture and fishery products during the emergency period, copies of animal health export certificates that meet the following conditions will be accepted:

- 1. The importer may submit an informal copy of the certificate, provided that the certificate conforms to the agreed formats and fulfils the requirements established in the animal health requirement sheets and the aquaculture health requirement sheets, as applicable.
- 2. The importer should send the original copy of a letter with a handwritten signature to the relevant OISA, in which it agrees to submit the original certificate no later than 15 days after the end of the emergency in the country of origin.
