PROGRAMME FOR WORKSHOP ON TRANSPARENCY

Note by the Secretariat¹

Revision

- 1. The Secretariat of the World Trade Organization is organizing a special workshop on the transparency provisions of the Agreement on the Application of Sanitary and Phytosanitary Measures (SPS Agreement), to be held in Geneva, Switzerland, on Monday, 15 October 2007 and in the morning on Tuesday, 16 October 2007. The workshop will be followed by informal and formal meetings of the SPS Committee, lasting until Friday, 19 October. Representatives of Members, Observers and Observer Organizations are all invited to participate in the transparency workshop as well as the subsequent meetings of the Committee.
- 2. The purpose of the workshop is to enhance the implementation of transparency obligations and to identify best practices for drawing benefits from a transparent system. Given the focus of this workshop, the Secretariat encourages in particular the participation of officials from Members' SPS Enquiry Points and National Notification Authorities as well as other relevant SPS officials.
- 3. As a preparatory step for the workshop, the Secretariat circulated a Questionnaire on the Operation of SPS Enquiry Points and National Notification Authorities in December 2006 (G/SPS/W/103/Rev.2) and issued an Analysis of the 58 replies to the Questionnaire in June 2007 (G/SPS/GEN/751/Rev.1). The individual replies which have been submitted electronically, including those that have arrived after the preparation of the Analysis, are available on the WTO Members' website (under WTO resources).
- 4. The workshop programme (attached) was prepared in light of the discussions and inputs in the context of the Second Review of the Operation and Implementation of the SPS Agreement, the transparency agenda item of the Committee, the results of the above-mentioned Questionnaire as well as comments from Members. Following a general introduction and a demonstration of the newly-launched SPS Information Management System by the Secretariat, the participants will mainly be working in break-out sessions. The objective will be to identify concrete actions, which can be taken at the national and international level, to enhance the use and usefulness of transparency provisions.
- 5. One of the specific areas for discussion during the workshop and the subsequent meeting of the SPS Committee will be the Committee's Recommended Procedures for Implementing the Transparency Obligations of the SPS Agreement (G/SPS/7/Rev.2). Delegations wishing to provide any specific proposals regarding a revision of these Procedures should submit them to the WTO (email: serra.ayral@wto.org) by 10 September at the latest, to allow enough time for reflection by Members and for any relevant preparations by the Secretariat.
